Mayor Irv Bock Opposes Swift Rail Development Act

The Village of Hanover Park is joining with other northeastern Illinois municipalities in urging the Federal Railway Administration to provide relief from the implications of the Swift Rail Development Act. At the Village Board meeting on May 4, 2000, the Village Board passed a resolution seeking legislative relief and modification of the proposed rules or special federal funding for at-grade crossing requirements for implementation of the Swift Rail Development Act. This Act was passed in 1994 for the Federal Railway Administration. The proposed rules would require trains in Hanover Park to sound their horns while approaching every street or highway railway grade crossing unless the crossing is in an appropriate quiet zone or exempt by regulations. There are approximately 302 at-grade crossings within the north/northwest suburbs. This horn blowing affects approximately 500,000 residents that live within one-half mile of those crossings. Currently, the requirements are that all trains blow whistles at these crossings no matter the time of the day or night to warn any motorists of the approaching train.

Municipalities take very seriously the health, safety, and welfare of our residents. Many other preventative measures would be more effective than hornblowing at railway crossings at all hours of the day and night. It is my belief, as well as that of other mayors in the Chicago metropolitan area, there should have been discussions with the municipalities affected to better determine what would be the appropriate safety measures taken for each crossing.

Eighty percent (80%) of the crossings in the north/northwest suburban area have had no collisions during the five-year period from 1993 through 1997 and less than 5% have had more than one collision. These are the individual crossings that should be addressed. Arbitrarily deciding that **all** 302 at-grade crossings should have the horn sounded at all hours of the day and night is not a viable solution.

Other mayors and I recognize the need to improve safety at at-grade railroad crossings. As northeast Illinois is the nation's railroad hub, these issues are especially pertinent. We, as elected officials, recognize the value of public education programs such as Operation Life Saver. We have focused attention on enforcing existing state laws which punish individuals who risk their lives and the lives of others by driving or walking around railroad crossing gates. We also continue to support the Illinois Commerce Commission's successful program to upgrade warning systems at crossings. As a direct result of these efforts, collisions at railroad crossings in Illinois have gone down nearly 60% over the past 12 years. Even more significant is the downward trend in collisions occurring during the period of time when automobile and train volume saw dramatic increases. Illinois is doing a very good job at improving

railway crossing safety.

After thorough review of the proposed train whistle rule, the Northwest Municipal Conference (which includes 45 member municipalities) contends the following:

1. The FRA's proposed rule as written cannot be effectively implemented in northeast Illinois.
2. It will divert resources away from already proven safety system upgrades.
3. Illinois is very unique with respect to its railroad grade crossing environment and needs more tailored solutions that complement current safety programs.

It is also felt that drivers' behavior at crossings in this region is unique because there are so many crossings along so many different lines within close proximity, drivers encounter both whistle-ban and no-ban crossings every day. The frequency of these encounters makes the possibility of a driver behaving differently at whistle-ban crossings highly unlikely. Drivers in this region know what to expect when they encounter a crossing regardless of whether or not the whistle is routinely sounded.

As you have seen, this is a very difficult issue for all municipalities. Implementation of the proposed rule and the lack of regional consensus on the rule for Illinois are serious concerns. We should take a step back, extend the period of time necessary to evaluate this process, and allow the municipalities—along with their state officials—to contact the Federal Railway Administration and develop a more definitive answer.

Residents should contact local federal governmental officials and voice their concerns about the impact that this whistle-blowing program will have on the Hanover Park community.

Financial Report

Village Receives GFOA Honors for Distinguished Budget

The Government Finance Officers Association of the United States and Canada (GFOA) presented the Village of Hanover Park with the GFOA's *Distinguished Budget Presentation Award* for the 11th time.

The award represents a significant achievement by the Village and the commitment of Village staff to meet the highest principles of government budgeting. In order to receive the budget award, the Village had to satisfy nationally-recognized guidelines for effective budget presentation. These guidelines are designed to assess how well a budget serves as: a policy document, a financial plan, an operations guide, and a communications device.

The Village budget is a public document on file at Village Hall and at both libraries. Interested residents

are encouraged to learn of Village functions and finance through perusal of the award-winning document.

New Water and Sewer Rates

Effective July 1, 2000 rates charged for water and sewer service increase approximately 5%. The rate adjustment is necessitated due to increased costs required to operate the water and sewer utility.

The primary reason for the water rate increase is the higher cost of water the Village must pay to the City of Chicago. The Village purchases Lake Michigan water from the City of Chicago. This purchase is the single, largest cost component to providing water. Effective January 1, 2000, and for the next three consecutive years, the City of Chicago is increasing by 4% the cost of water charged to all suburban agencies.

Sewer rates also are adjusted by

approximately 5%. Recently, the Village completed major sewer facility improvements including the construction of an increased capacity treatment plant. Also, repair of sewer mains and sewer relining programs continue. The sewer rate adjustment provides funding for repayment of low interest loans obtained to finance the expanded plant project and the continuation of sewer pipe maintenance programs.

A three-year Village rate program was enacted with each annual increase equal to less than 5%. Based on water usage of 14,000 gallons, a Cook County resident will see an average bill increase of \$2.94, while a DuPage County resident can anticipate a \$4.48 increase in a two-month usage bill.

Village Vehicle Stickers

The deadline for displaying 2000–01 vehicle stickers is June 30th. For your convenience, the Village Clerk's Office will be open on Saturday, June 24th from 8 AM to noon and on Friday, June 30th from 8 AM to 7 PM. Late penalties for previously-registered vehicles go into effect July 1st. Vehicle stickers must be displayed in the lower, right-hand corner of the windshield by midnight June 30th. Police will ticket vehicles without valid stickers beginning July 1st.

Village Prepares Balanced 2001 Budget

On April 20, 2000 the Village Board approved the 2001 Village Budget providing funding for services between May 1, 2000 and April 30, 2001. The total budget, in the amount of \$29,408,895, is 8% less than the prior year. The average property tax rate, stemming from the new budget, is projected to decrease .3%.

The budget addresses primary Village Board goals including public safety, appearance, and infrastructure improvements.

Additional public safety allocations include expanded funding for the Neighborhood Response Team, purchase of less-than-lethal munitions, and pursuit of police department accreditation through a national police agency entitled "The Commission on Accreditation for Law Enforcement" (CALEA).

In conjunction with the State of Illinois, the Village is pursuing the reconstruction of Lake Street and the Metra viaduct which is located immediately east of the Lake Street and Barrington Road intersection. \$850,000 is budgeted to complete design engineering for this \$20 million reconstruction project. The Village is acting as "lead agency" for this important transportation project. All engineering costs paid by the Village will be reimbursed by the State.

Several projects are funded to improve the appearance of rights-of-way and public property. For example, maintenance of the landscape area on the north side of Army Trail Road will be improved. Landscaping improvements also are planned for the south side of the commuter parking station. A fence and sidewalk

will be constructed on the east side of Barrington Road from Walnut Avenue to Hillcrest Drive. Entryway signs are budgeted for highly visible areas including a site on Irving Park Road.

The Village is also acting as lead agency for a planned bike trail beginning at the intersection of Greenbrook Boulevard and Arlington Drive East and extending to the Mallard Lake Forest Preserve. The \$289,000 construction project will wind through Heritage Park. The Village is fronting the project costs but will receive 100% reimbursement by DuPage County Forest Preserve District.

The Fiscal Year 2001 Village Budget is balanced; recurring revenues exceed operating expenditures. The Village Board is committed to providing quality municipal services within budgetary constraints.

Home Improvement 0% Interest Loan Program

Qualified homeowners may be eligible for a 0% interest deferred loan up to a maximum amount of \$25,000 with no monthly payments as long as the homeowner lives in and retains title to the home.

The North West Housing Partnership (NWHP) will determine the amount of assistance the applicant is eligible for. These loans are part of the Cook County Community Development Block Grant Program and HOME Investment Partnerships Pro-

gram, which are funded by the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development.

The money can be used to correct problems that make your house either unsafe or cause it to deteriorate. Loans are not made for interior or exterior decorating. The following types of repairs can be covered: basic structural repairs, roofing, doors and windows, electrical, plumbing, heating, and weatherization.

To qualify for a loan at the minimum

you must: live in the Cook County portion of Hanover Park, own and live in the home you wish to repair, not have the financial ability to pay for the repairs, and meet total family income requirements.

Remember To Water Your Trees

Trees planted within the last two years need plenty of water. If you have a new tree on your property or in the parkway in front of your home, please remember to water it regularly.

Help Prevent Sanitary Sewer Back-Ups

Sanitary sewer back-ups can be both costly and frustrating. Fortunately, there are some things you can do to minimize the possibility of back-ups in your home.

Sewer back-ups are usually caused by introducing materials or products into the sewer system that should be disposed of someplace else. These things cause blockages within your home sanitary service line or the Village's main line sewer system.

The products that cause problems most often include:

- *cooking grease,
- *garbage disposal by-products,
- *feminine hygiene products,
- *disposable diapers, and
- *other heavy paper products.

Please follow the manufacturer's suggestions for disposal to reduce the possibilities of sewer back-ups and their associated costs. If you have questions regarding your sewer service line, call Joe Romero at 630-372-4440.

If you are experiencing a problem with your sewer line, call the Public Works Department during regular working hours at 630-372-4440 or

the Police nonemergency number at 630-372-4400 after hours and on weekends. A service representative will be dispatched to check the Village's main line sewer system. If the main line is clear, you will be advised to contact a plumber.

Sump Pumps

Sump pumps collect the ground water and pump it away from the house. The sump pump should discharge onto the ground. **It is illegal to have the sump pump connected to the sanitary sewer.**

The sump pump discharge pipe must extend well beyond the house, be directed to the downstream end of the lot, and reach no closer than three feet from the property line. The sump pump discharge should not cause a nuisance on a neighbor's property.

Downspouts

Downspouts must be directed away from the house and generally point toward the front or rear yards. It is important to keep downspout water away from the foundation. Downspout extensions are an easy first step to direct water away from the foundation.

Barrington Road Sidewalk & Fence Program

As a continuation of the Village's ongoing arterial fence program, a new eight-foot high cedar board-on-board fence will be constructed this year on the east side of Barrington Road from Walnut Avenue to Hillcrest Avenue. In addition to the fence, a five-foot wide sidewalk will also be installed, providing pedestrian access along Barrington Road to the Metropolitan Water Reclamation District (MWRD) ballfields. The fence and sidewalk project will be identical to last year's project of the east side of Barrington Road north of Hillcrest Avenue. It is anticipated that the construction will take place during June or July of this year.

Safety Reminders

Candle Safety

The use of candles has increased greatly over the last few years. Sadly, the number of fires caused by candles has increased as well.

There are several types of candle holders that can be purchased that will safely hold melting wax while providing a noncombustible barrier between the candle and the surface of a table, dresser, etc.

Remember, a candle burning can cause a fire that could burn your entire house!

Fuji Photo Film USA Breaks Ground in Turnberry Lakes Business Park!

Sign Regulation Reminders

Temporary Signs

Acceptable Locations

- Signs may only be displayed on private property.
- Signs may not be attached to trees, utility poles, parked vehicles, fences, or roofs.
- Signs are not permitted in Village parkways (i.e., the area between the sidewalk and street).

Residential Garage Sale Signs

- Only one sign is permitted on the private property (not parkway) where the sale is located. If the property is on a corner lot, two signs may be displayed on private property, one facing each street.
- Signs may not exceed six square feet per side and four feet in height.
- Signs must indicate the address and dates of the sale.
- Off-site signs shall be permitted only on private property and only with the consent of the owner.
- Signs must be removed after the sale.

Residential Real Estate Signs

- Only one sign is permitted on the property (not parkway) being sold. If the property is a corner lot, two signs are allowed, one facing each street.
- The maximum size of each sign is six (6) square feet.
- The sign must be removed within seven (7) days of the closing.
- Realtors are allowed to place one (1) open house sign at the nearest intersection to the property. The sign must be placed on private property, and permission of the property owner is required. Signs may only be displayed on Saturdays and Sundays between 12:00 noon and 6:00 PM.

Note: Permits are not required for garage sale and real estate signs. However, illegal signs will be removed and disposed of by Village personnel.

Extended Department Hours

The Community Development Department will be open every Thursday evening until 7:30 PM from now through September during building permit season. This customer service is provided for those that cannot visit during regular business hours, Monday through Friday from 8:00 AM until 4:30 PM.

Community Appearance Awards

Start painting, planting, and pruning now for the Community Appearance Award Program this summer. Judging is based on the overall appearance of the property. All residential properties are eligible. Categories include: single-family and multifamily. Prizes will not be awarded to any property in consecutive years. Call 372-4280 with your name and the address of the property you would like to nominate. The deadline for entry is July 30, 2000.

National Night Out

On Tuesday, August 1, 2000, the Village of Hanover Park will participate in the annual National Night Out event. This program is designed to promote crime prevention and encourage neighbors to work together to prevent crime in their neighborhood by reporting unusual activity to the police.

This year, National Night Out will be held at Ahlstrand Park and Rinne Pool. Festivities will include video printing for children, hot dogs courtesy of the Lions Club, crime prevention information, and an antique car show.

COPS Day Picnics

The Police Department will once again be hosting COPS Day picnics to foster better relationships with members of the community. The picnics will be held in residential areas throughout the Village. On June 10th, the first picnic of the year will be held at the Glendale Terrace Apartments from 1–4 PM. Another picnic will be held at Ranger Park on June 21st from 5–7 PM. The picnics provide games, refreshments, and a clown and face painting to entertain children.

The Police Department continues to provide the community with excellent service. In addition to the men and women who serve in handling daily activities, the department participates in many additional activities which are designed to enhance the partnership between the community and the police. Mallard Lake News

Landfill Capping

Residents may have noticed significant activity taking place at the Mallard Lake Landfill. The landfill stopped accepting waste in March 1999. Since that time, BFI Waste Systems has been in the process of completing the leachate and gas collection systems and “capping” the landfill, which will cover and protect the waste within the landfill. Part of the landfill has already been capped; BFI is now constructing the final cover for the remaining portion of the landfill.

The final cap will consist, from bottom to top, of a one- to three-foot thick layer of mixed soil, a bentonite clay mat, a liner, a drainage layer, a woven fabric, and an additional two and one-half feet of soil, with six inches of topsoil that will be seeded for vegetation. This type of cap is considered very protective of the environment and is approved by the Illinois Environmental Protection Agency (IEPA).

The capping will eliminate (or greatly reduce) the occasional odors from the landfill since the waste will be completely covered. BFI is required to monitor the conditions of the landfill (including regular testing of groundwater) and to maintain the landfill's systems, including the cap.

Bike Paths

The Mallard Lake Advisory Committee and the DuPage County Forest Preserve District are pursuing construction of a bike path and trail head through Heritage Park and the School District 20 property to connect to the northern boundary of the Mallard Lake Preserve. A series of bike paths have been planned for the Mallard Lake Preserve, around Mallard Lake, the Hawk Hollow Preserve, and connections to other regional trails.

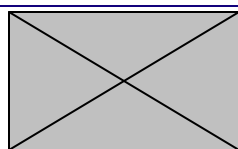

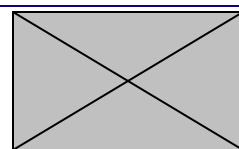
