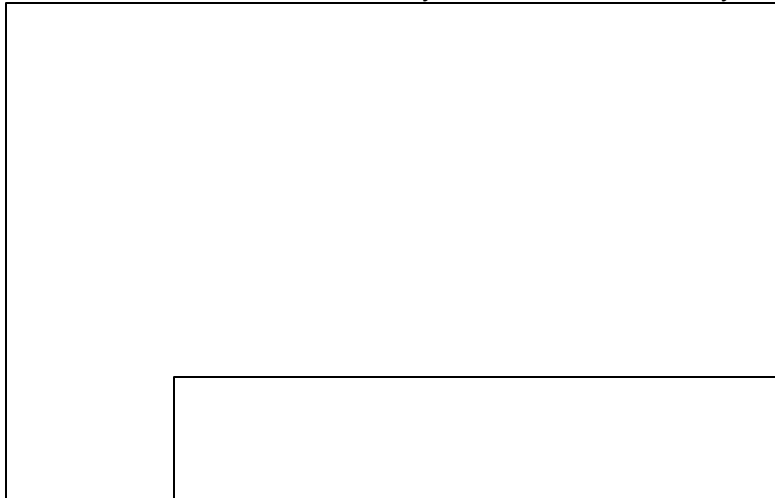


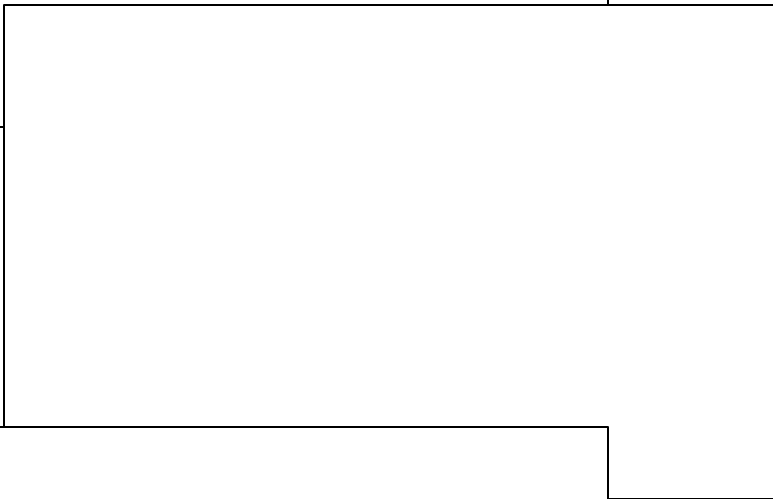
## Thousands Enjoyed Harvest Fest 2000!

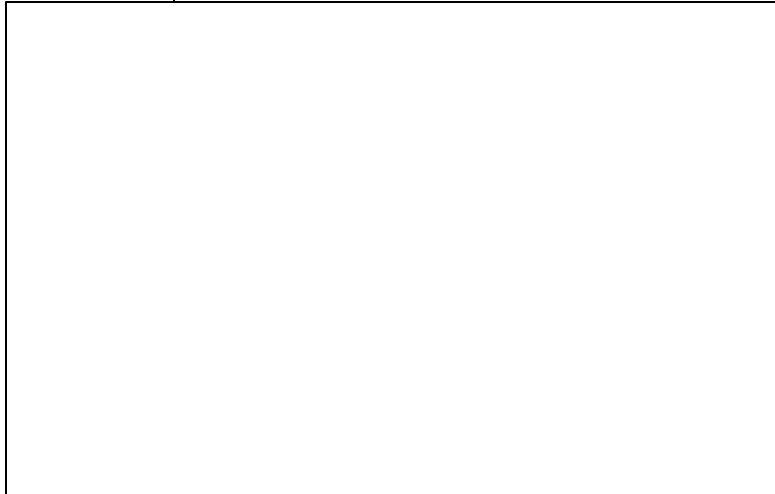


Marshall Tucker kicked off Harvest Fest weekend, performing Friday, Sept. 1st!

### Election Judges Needed

Election day is Tuesday, November 7, 2000. Polls will be open from 6:00 AM to 7:00 PM. Both counties are in need of election judges. ### Vehicle Stickers

Remember, you have 30 days to purchase a vehicle sticker for a new car. If the newly-purchased vehicle is replacing a vehicle which had a valid sticker, you may transfer the sticker registration to the new car for a \$3 transfer fee. Village Ordinance requires residents to display a current vehicle sticker on all vehicles.

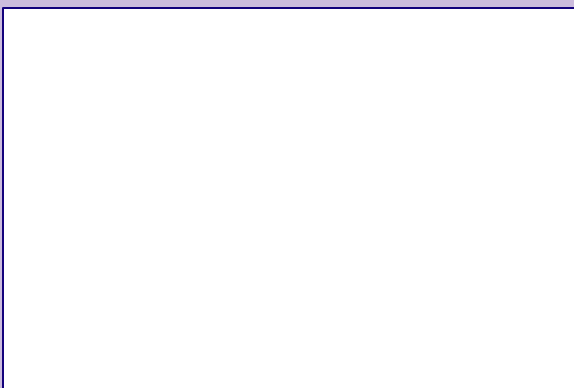

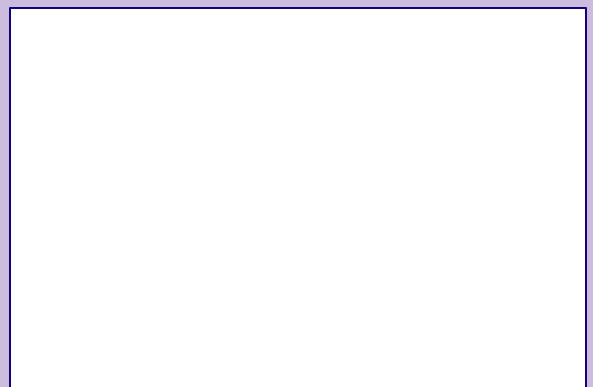

# Police Department News

## Police Receive Awards for Seat Belt Enforcement Program

## New Vehicle Noise Ordinance

The Village recently passed a new Ordinance regulating sound amplification systems in motor vehicles. It provides that no driver shall operate a vehicle within the Village with a sound amplification system that can be heard more than 75 feet from outside the vehicle. The minimum fine for this violation, upon conviction, is \$100.

## Barking Dog Reminder

Please do not let your dog bark or howl for any length of time, day or night. This can be extremely irritating to your neighbors and is in violation of Village Ordinance! Tickets for barking dogs can be issued by the Police Department upon complaint.

Ed Herzog presented four-year old Autumn Belmore with a *Certificate of Appreciation* (and several stuffed animals!) for her quick thinking in alerting her parents to a fire she saw outside Greenbrook School. Her parents quickly called 9-1-1 and the fire was extinguished before anyone was injured.

## Change Your Clock - Change Your Battery!

With fall upon us, it will soon be time to turn back the clocks. This is also a good time to change the battery in your smoke or carbon monoxide detectors and make sure that they are working properly. Residents who do not have a smoke detector in their home, or absolutely cannot afford to purchase a replacement detector, can contact Firefighter/Paramedic Darren Nocks for further assistance at (630) 837-5181.

Here are a few frequently asked questions regarding smoke detectors:

### How much does a smoke detector cost?

A smoke detector may be purchased at most retail stores for prices ranging from \$5 to \$20.

### What kind of smoke detector should I buy?

Both battery-powered and house current-powered smoke detectors do a good job. Make sure the one you choose has been tested by a nationally-recognized testing laboratory.

### How many smoke detectors do I need?

There should be at least one detector on every floor of the house except attics, unless the attic space is used for sleeping. Additional detectors will increase the chance of early detection.

## Fire Safety Tips

Here are a few tips for you and your family to prevent injury in the event of a fire in your home:

- Plan a home escape route in the event of a fire.
- Know what to do when a smoke detector sounds off.
- Always sleep with the bedroom or hall door closed, It can keep out fire long enough to allow escape through your emergency escape route (usually a window).
- Make certain that smoke detectors are installed and operating properly in bedrooms and hallways.
- Don't waste time gathering valuables. In a fire, every second counts!
- Check doors for heat before opening. Intense heat and deadly smoke or fire could be on the other side.
- **DON'T HIDE—GO OUTSIDE!** Don't hide under beds or in closets.
- **ONCE OUT—STAY OUT**, and have an outside meeting place to quickly check if everyone is safe.
- Plan to use a neighbor's phone to dial 9-1-1.
- Conduct family fire drills and practice your escape routes. Test your smoke detector to sound the alarm!

# Village Continues Focus on Corridor Improvements

*The Village continues to focus on improving the appearance of prominent Village corridors. Several improvement projects are underway.*

## **Barrington Road**

On the east side of Barrington Road, a new sidewalk was constructed between Walnut and Hillcrest. In addition, an 8' cedar fence was constructed to create a more attractive and consistent appearance.

## **Army Trail Road**

The Village added Army Trail Road to the Village Roadway Maintenance

Program. DuPage County previously maintained the north side of Army Trail Road and now the Village will mow, trim, and provide weed treatment on a regular maintenance schedule. Similarly, last year the Village expanded roadway maintenance to include County Farm Road between Schick Road and Lawrence Avenue.

## **Median Improvements**

In recent years, the Village has "added a splash of color" to medians at Olde Salem and Irving Park Road, Windmill and County Farm, and Woodlake at Army Trail

to name a few. This fall the Village will add similar accent landscaping to medians on Arlington Drive at County Farm Road and Sycamore Avenue at Barrington Road. These projects improve the appearance of corridors and enhance neighborhood entrances.

## **Code Enforcement**

In addition to landscaping and maintenance, the Village also stepped up enforcement of illegal signs that clutter roadways. The Code Enforcement Division of the Police Department removed almost 1000 illegal signs over the summer.

### **Code Enforcement Reminder**

Residents and businesses are reminded to contact the Village's **Code Enforcement Hotline** at **630/372-4262** any time a code violation is observed. Once a call comes in, it will be directed to the proper department for follow-up. In *residential areas*, including apartments, townhomes, duplexes, and single-family areas, code enforcement activities are handled by the Police Department. In *commercial areas*, such as stores, shopping centers, and business parks, code enforcement activities are handled by the Community Development Department.

### **Extended Hours**

As a convenience to Hanover Park's residents and businesses throughout the year, the Community Development Department will maintain extended hours (8:00 AM through 7:30 PM) the first Thursday of every month beginning in October through April, 2001. To serve

residents, regular Department hours are 8:00 a.m. through 4:30 p.m. Call 630/372-4260 with any questions.

### **Remodeling Class Scheduled**

The Department of Community Development invites all Hanover Park residents to a remodeling class on Saturday, October 21, 2000 from 9:00 a.m. to 12:00 noon at the Village Hall. Topics to be presented by the Department's inspectors include: basement buildouts, electrical, framing, mechanical, insulation, and plumbing. #### *Welcome Walgreen's!*

Walgreen's recently obtained Village approval to construct a new freestanding store at the southwest corner of County Farm and Stearns Roads. The facility will include a drive-through lane for prescription pickup. Staff has worked closely with the developer to ensure that this new facility includes an attractive exterior and significant landscape plantings. The vacant Fire Station #2 will be torn down and removed prior to construction of the new store, which will contain about 15,000 square feet.

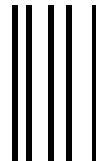

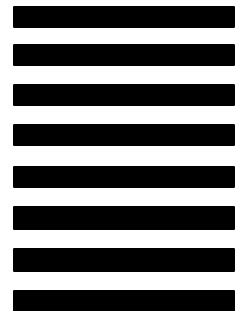

## Leaf Pickup Reminders



Autumn, although beautiful, requires leaf disposal. Leaves generated from parkway trees in public streets are collected by Village crews. Trees and leaves on private property are the homeowner's responsibility.

Depositing leaves on public property is prohibited. Violators face a minimum \$100 fine. Raking leaves into streets strains Village street-sweeping efforts. Vast quantities of leaves in the street also increase the potential for flooding because storm sewer inlets become clogged. Residents can choose from three options to properly dispose of leaves:

1. Dispose of leaves in a backyard composting area;
2. Mulch leaves by running over them with a lawn mower (you

may wish to use the mulch for landscaping purposes, such as around shrubs); or

3. Place leaves in a yardwaste container, attach a yardwaste sticker (\$1.24 per sticker), and have them collected by BFI. If you have a scavenger other than BFI, please contact them for yardwaste collection information.

The Village recommends options #1 and #2. The escalating cost of disposing of leaves at a landscape waste facility is greater than disposing of garbage at a landfill.

**BFI's final yardwaste collection day is Saturday, November 25, 2000.**

## Free Wood Chips!

The Village will deliver loads of wood chips, a by-product of the Village's brush pickup program, to residents free of charge.

Each load will average about four cubic yards—enough to fill an area six feet by six feet by three feet high (6' x 6' x 3'). The Public Works Department will deliver the wood chips and will dump them in the driveway only. Wood chips will not be dumped on driveway aprons, sidewalks, or lawns.

Please stop by the Public Works facility before ordering to take a look at the wood chips. For more information or to request a delivery, please call the Public Works Department at 372-4440.

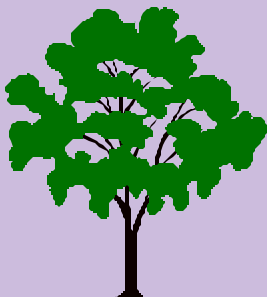

## Fall Tree Pruning



The Village's Fall Tree Maintenance Program will include pruning 1,761 parkway trees in the Longmeadows North Subdivision which is north of Irving Park Road and east of Barrington Road. On September 21, the Village Board awarded the tree-trimming contract to Burke's Tree Service who has been trimming and removing trees for the Village for the past 15 years.

Trees are pruned to protect their health, growth, and appearance. Lower branches are removed to improve tree appearance and prevent injury to passing pedestrians and vehicles.

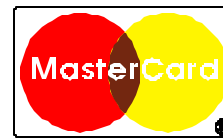
