Hanover Park Fire Department Invites Interested Residents to be Part of the New Fire Corps

The Department of Homeland Security Citizen Corps Program recently gave its stamp of approval to the Hanover Park Fire Department's request to create a Fire Corps team. Fire Corps is a key component of the Citizens Corps initiatives introduced by President George W. Bush after the attacks of September 11, 2001. This grass roots effort was developed as a way to enable local citizens to be actively involved in making their communities and the nation safer, stronger, and better prepared to take action during an emergency. Currently, there are over 2,300 local Citizen Corps Councils which serve over 78% of the total U.S. population.



After successful completion of Community Emergency Response Team (CERT) training, interested Hanover Park residents may apply for membership in the Fire Corps program.

The Fire Corps team is a group of citizen volunteers who provide assistance to the Village of Hanover Park Fire Department in multiple ways, including public education initiatives and firefighter rehab duties at emergency scenes and training evolutions.



The Hanover Park Fire Department Fire Corps Incident Rehab team has already been called into service at emergency incidents in Hanover Park, Bloomingdale, Bartlett and Streamwood (see photos above and right).

Fire Corps members must attend training on the third Tuesday of every month from 6:30 p.m. until 10:00 p.m. Uniforms and training are provided at no cost.

12 Village Streets Scheduled for Resurfacing

The Village of Hanover Park will be resurfacing 12 streets throughout the Village this spring.

The work will begin in May and will consist of grinding approximately two inches of existing asphalt off of the 12 streets and replacing with a new two inch thick asphalt surface course. Prior to the resurfacing, drainage structures will be rebuilt, sections of deteriorated pavement will be patched, and deteriorated sections of curb and gutter will be replaced. The resurfacing is expected to be completed by the end of June.

Sewer Backups in Your Basement? Village Will Help Pay Cost of an Overhead Sewer

If you have experienced sewer backups from floor drains or fixtures, we have good news for you.

The Village may be able to help cover the cost of the installation of an overhead sewer system, which can help prevent such backups in your basement.

The Village's program covers 75% of the cost of the installation work, up to \$5,000. You, the homeowner, are responsible for the remainder.

New Water and Sewer Rates Effective May 1

The Village Board recently approved a water and sewer rate adjustment effective May 1, 2008. The last water and sewer rate increase was effective July 1, 2004, nearly four years ago. The Village purchases Lake Michigan water from the City of Chicago. Chicago recently announced a three-year water rate increase of 15% effective January 1, 2008 and 2009 and 14% effective



January 1, 2010. This rate increase will affect the Village's water rate. In addition, the Village had a Water and Sewer Rate Study performed by Baxter & Woodman, Inc. during the prior fiscal year. They recommended an increase to the Village's rates to cover operating expenses and to allow for future improvements to infrastructure including water mains and sewer lines. Some of the Village's water and sewer infrastructure is over 50 years old and in need of

replacement. A decrease in the minimum water bill consumption amount from 14,000 gallons to 12,000 gallons was also recommended. The minimum bill addresses the need to cover the fixed costs associated with providing water service to the residents including billing, meter reading, and equipment and infrastructure maintenance. The 12,000-gallon minimum bill amount approximates the median residential consumption for the Village. As in the past, eligible residential customers over the age of 65 are not subject to the minimum bill.



A four-year annual rate increase of 8.00% for water and 4.5% for sewer was approved as follows:

The rates are per 1,000 gallons of water used during the two month billing period. Sewer rates are lower in Cook County because Cook County residents pay an additional sewer charge on their property tax bills to the Metropolitan Water Reclamation District for sewage treatment. DuPage County residents submit their entire payment for sewer service, including treatment, to the Village because the Village operates the sewage treatment plant for customers in DuPage County.

Customers using less than 13,000 gallons per bimonthly billing period will see a reduction in their water and sewer bill in the first year of the rate adjustment due to the decrease in the minimum water bill amount. A chart showing the impact of the rate adjustment on sample customer's bimonthly water and sewer bills in the first year follows:

All About Wireless Joins Hanover Park Business Community



HOT OFF THE GRILL

Will this winter weather ever end? My thoughts have turned to Spring, and all I have to look at is snow. I'm anxious for spring because it means that we can get started on a number of different projects. First and foremost however, I want to take this opportunity to welcome the new Hanover Park Chamber of Commerce and Industry and its President, Patricia Langenstrauss. Community leaders have put considerable effort over the last 12 months into creating this organization. Their work is to be commended, and I'm looking forward to working with Patricia and the "Chamber". In fact, when I finish this article, I'm sending in my application to join.



My staff is currently reviewing several development plans, the largest being a 217,000 square foot Menards Home Improvement center. This building is proposed for the old Tradewinds Shopping Center property at the northeast corner of Barrington Road and Irving Park Road. We are also reviewing construction plans for a new Bank of America that will replace the Blockbuster building at the same corner. This corner could be very busy this summer.

Along Lake Street, west of Barrington Road, there are three projects that could be moving forward this spring. The first is a 150-bed skilled nursing care facility operated by NuCare. This would be a four-story, all brick building located along the north side of Lake Street about halfway between Church Street and Center Avenue. NuCare would like to begin construction of this \$18 million dollar facility by sometime in March or April.

Immediately west of this site is the former Lakewood Restaurant. Staff is currently processing a variance for this property that was necessitated by the expansion of Lake Street a few years ago. The new plan is to raze the old building on the west side of the lot and build a new brick restaurant serving Italian food for lunch and dinner on the east side of the property. The plans include an outdoor seating area on the west side of the building to take advantage of the evening sun, and for those of us that like to eat "al fresco".

At the northeast corner of Lake Street and Center Avenue is the old Suburban Tire. Plans and agreements are being prepared that include demolition of the existing building and construction of a new Suburban Tire facility. It is anticipated that the owner, Steve Leffler, will try to gain LEED-certification for this structure. Staff is currently processing a variance and special-use request for this site which should be before the Development Commission in March or April.

All in all, 2008 could be a break-out year for commercial development in Hanover Park. C'mon Spring!

Spotlight on Business

Camcraft

One of the many highlights of Hanover Park's 50th Anniversary Dinner in February was Mayor Rod Craig's presentation of the Mayor's Choice Award for Business of the

Year. This year's award went to Camcraft, a family-owned business primarily serving the truck and diesel automotive industry. Originally founded in 1950 in Franklin Park, Camcraft has been a fixture in Turnberry Lakes Business Park since 1994.

About two years ago, Camcraft completed a 21,000 square-foot expansion that increased the size of its building to 110,000 square feet. Following completion of the expansion, sales doubled. Camcraft currently employs 220 people at its facility on Muirfield Drive.

One of the many factors associated with the Mayor's Choice Award is involvement in the community. This is an area where Camcraft excels. For the past 12 years, the company has partnered with 5th and 6th graders from Parkwood Elementary School. The students spend their lunch hour over a five week period to build and fly an airplane. In addition, the 6th graders build an RC car and race it on a track at Camcraft's facility. Camcraft also operates a similar program with a local church and an after-school program called "Cross Roads".

Camcraft also sponsored a CONECT after-hours program last fall that attracted more than 60 people. Camcraft personnel offered tours of their expanded facility, giving attendees an "up close and personal" view of their operation.

This award marks the second time that Camcraft has won the

Mayor's Choice Award. Camcraft has the distinction of being the only two-time winner of the Mayor's Choice Award. Congratulations!





Service to Youth Award



A Look Back at the Past

Hanover Park Streets Clear Despite Big Snow! February 21, 1963

The big snow, high winds and bitter cold of the past weeks have not daunted Hanover Parks able snow removal crew headed by Anthony "Red" Bursha of 6970 Church Street, who also doubles as Village Water Commissioner. Red has been out at all hours keeping the Village streets clear, and has also managed to find time in between cat-naps to keep the access to the Hanover Park N Shop shopping center open.

Because of Commission Bursha's bravery against the cold, when even Illinois State Highway snow removal equipment was hard put to fight the elements, Hanover Park can boast having some of the best plowed streets in northwest Cook County. Also, thanks to the alertness of Mayor Gordon D. Jensen, the Village also has one of the best snow-plowed shopping centers around.

It happened this way: When the bad weather stunned the area suddenly last month, the shopping centers private maintenance crew was caught unpre-

pared. Equipment froze and could not be operated. For a while it looked as if there would be difficulty in keeping the parking area clear and the stores open. Barney Dahl, one of the owners of Hanover's Builders and also owner of the shopping center called Mayor Jensen who, with the cooperation of the energetic Bursha, promptly "saved the day."

Mayor Jensen told the Hanover Times that while village equipment should not be used on private property, he reasoned that the keeping of access to the stores clear was reasonable, right and proper in view of the fact that the village obtains a 1/2 cent tax on all sales made in the stores and thousands of dollars from the municipal tax levy. Couple these benefits with the fact that over half of the shoppers who spend money in the stores live outside the village boundaries, and we would like them to continue and come back and shop here. We want and need that revenue. Besides, he said, as long as our own village streets are clear and the snow plow is idle, we might as well earn some additional revenue, and benefit ourselves at the same time.

Commissioner Bursha was contacted and asked how he was able to operate at such a rapid pace in plowing the streets. His reply, "Man it was co-o-old! I wanted to hurry up and get back home where it was warm. You think I wanted to stay outside? A man could freeze to death."

Hanover Park Continues to Provide Residents Safe Access February 26, 2008

The 2008 winter season has proved to be one for the record books. With over 54 inches of snow falling thus far, Hanover Park's snow removal crews have logged many man hours keeping streets clean and safe for its residents. The Village's snow fleet consists of nine large dump trucks and several smaller vehicles equipped with plows. To date, crews have completed over 30 salting/plowing operations and have used in excess of 2,600 tons of salt. With approximately 100 miles of streets, such a daunting task is readily handled by the hard work and dedication of the Public Works Department. In addition to the miles of streets, the Public Works Department also maintains the Commuter Parking Lot facilities. Crews are in well before the morning rush so commuters have a safe, snow-free area to park. As occurred in 1963 and remains 45 years later, the Village continues to provide excellent snow removal services.

Annual Spring Hydrant Flushing Begins On May 5

It's that time of year again. Beginning Monday, May 5 and continuing through Friday, May 16, the Village Water Division will be flushing hydrants throughout the Village. The flushing will occur between the hours of 6:00 AM and 2:00 PM. Notices will be posted in designated areas prior to flushing.

Residents should not wash laundry during the flushing hours as rust staining of clothing may result. Residents with water softeners are encouraged to check the cycle time of their softeners so that the unit does not regenerate during this period.

Residents often ask why the Village flushes fire hydrants every year. The answer is that regular hydrant flushing is a vital part of routine maintenance for the water system for these important reasons:

- **Improves water quality:** Flushing removes minerals such as iron and magnesium that have collected in the water mains.
- **Improves water flow:** By removing these minerals, the inside diameter of a water main is increased and therefore allows a better flow of water.
- **Hydrant maintenance:** A fire hydrant is a mechanical device. Operation of a hydrant lubricates internal mechanisms and gaskets.
- **Hydrant inspection:** Any deficiencies are noted and repaired as necessary to insure that each hydrant will perform when needed for an emergency.

Hydrants will be flushed by area according to the following schedule:

South of Irving Park Road, north of Lake Street, west of Barrington Road

May 8, 9

South of Irving Park Road and east of Barrington Road, (Hanover Highlands and Longmeadows South Areas)

May 12, 13, 14, 15

Jensen Boulevard east to Farmstead Lane, north of Irving Park Road to Cynthia Lane and Hastings Lane

DUPAGE COUNTY

May 5, 6, 7, 8

South of Devon Avenue, east of Church Road, west of Arlington Drive East (Greenbrook Area) Fremont and Glens area.

May 9, 12

South of Stearns Road, north of Schick Road

May 13, 14, 15, 16

South of Schick Road to Army Trail Road, east of Bayside Drive to west of Kuhn Road and west of Windjammer Lane.

Brush Pickup Program Resumes April 7

The Village of Hanover Park's annual Brush Pickup Program will begin in April. Following are the procedures you'll need to follow in order to comply with requirements for the program.

Set-Out Time – 7:00 AM

Brush can only be set out two days prior to 7:00 AM on your pick up day. Please do not put brush out after 7:00 AM on the first day of your collection cycle. Hold it for the next scheduled pickup. The Village incurs considerable cost returning to an area to collect brush set out after the first day of the collection cycle. It may take more than one day to pick up all the brush in a designated area. If brush is not picked up on the first day, it will still be picked up.

Brush Pickup Schedule

April 7th – Area 1:

Streets north of Lake Street and west of Barrington Road.

April 14th – Area 2:

Streets north of Lake Street and east of Barrington Road

April 21st – Area 3:

Streets south of Lake Street and north of Lawrence Avenue

April 28th – Area 4:

Streets south of Lawrence Avenue

What will be picked up:

- Branches a minimum of 2 feet in length and up to a maximum of 10 feet in length, and less than eight inches in diameter.

What will NOT be picked up:

- Small hedge or pine clippings.
- Yard waste or brush in containers.
- Brush or branches with thorns.
- Tree stumps and roots.

How to stack the brush:

- Brush should be stacked in one direction with the butt end toward the street.
- No lumber, wire, rope, or other materials may be included with the brush.
- Brush must NOT block the sidewalk.

PUBLIC WORKS DEPARTMENT NOW HIRING SEASONAL EMPLOYEES

The Village has immediate openings for full time seasonal laborers to work 40 hours per week, 6:00 a.m.-2:30 p.m., Monday thru Friday, in the Public Works Department. Those hired will work from April thru September or July thru December performing various manual tasks in the maintenance of Village property and/or the repair of roads and drainage structures, and other related work. An ability to understand and follow instructions and the ability to perform strenuous work in varying weather conditions is required.

Applicants must be at least 18 years of age, possess a valid driver's license and steel-toe safety shoes. Hiring is contingent on prospective employees passing an employer-paid drug screening.

The starting salary is \$10.00 per hour. Wage increases are based upon performance and the ability to meet established goals and objectives. Seasonal employees are not eligible for any benefits other than those required by law. The selection process will include a review of the candidate's past work experience, a personal interview, and background checks. A yardwaste disposal sticker must be affixed to each Kraft paper yardwaste bag or through the handle of each plastic or metal container left at the curb.
