Winter Parking

With winter around the corner, just a reminder that winter parking regulations will soon be in effect. There is no parking on village streets after a **TWO** inch snow fall.



62-11-1323. Limited parking for snow removal.



It shall be unlawful to park any vehicle on any public street in the village at any time within 24 hours after a snowfall of two inches or more has occurred, except on those streets where late night parking is permitted in section 62-11-1327(b), that within

24 hours after a snowfall of two or more inches vehicles shall be parked only on the side of the street on the day during which late night parking is permitted.

Vehicles Left Running & Unattended

With winter coming, it's typical for one to start their vehicle to let it warm up and leave it unattended. Most vehicle thefts that occur within the Village are crimes of opportunity where the victim leaves their vehicle running and unattended while they run in for that cup of coffee at the convenience store or simply leave it unattended in their driveway to warm up. Help us lower crime rates, protect your investment and help prevent crime by staying with your car while it warms up, or turning it off at the convenience stores & gas stations and securing it.



(625 ILCS 5/11-1401) (from Ch. 95 1/2, par. 11-1401)

Sec. 11-1401. Unattended motor vehicles. No person driving or in charge of a motor vehicle shall permit it to stand unattended without first stopping the engine, locking the ignition, removing the key from the ignition, effectively setting the brake thereon and, when standing upon any perceptible grade, turning the front wheels to the curb or side of the highway.



Holiday Lights Ordinance

Just a reminder that pursuant to Village Code 30-1(590.3B) holiday lights must be taken down within 90 days of the holiday.

Christmas lights must be down by April 1, 2017.

Overnight Parking Program

Ordinance #62-11-1327(a)

With holiday parties and visiting relatives, you may need to park a vehicle on the street between 2:00 a.m. and 6:00 a.m. To get permission, you will need access to the internet and a valid email address. Visit our website at www.hpil.org, and under the "Most Popular Links" section on the home screen, click on Night Parking. Complete the online form and submit your request. Requests must be received prior to the 2:00 a.m. cutoff time. A confirmation of your request will be sent to the email address you provided. You will need this just in case a ticket is issued. Night Parking permission is given four times every thirty days per household. If you do not have access to the internet, please call 630-823-5500.

Holiday Safety Tips

The holiday season is upon us and we will find our schedules filled with many seasonal activities. Unfortunately, this is also a time when the criminal element uses our schedules and softening of our safety techniques to take advantage. We need to take a moment to remind ourselves of some general crime prevention techniques.

- Take your time when driving, increase your space between cars, be aware of black ice, have your vehicle winterized (scraper, fluids, tire condition, full tank of gas)
- Lock your car doors. The vast majority of thefts from motor vehicles occur from vehicles with unlocked doors.
- Place bags, packages, electronics, and change in your trunk or out of sight. Do not make the burglar's job easy.
- Make your house look as if someone is always home. Keep lights on the inside and outside, using timers to achieve this when no one is home. Make sure your interior garage door is locked and that you close the exterior door.
- When shopping, do not overburden yourself with too many packages or bags, your purse or wallet could be an easy mark for thieves. Be aware of your surroundings.
- Keep records of the serial numbers for all big-ticket purchases, take pictures of them and inscribe each item with something that will help it to be identified. Your initials or address for example. Break down the boxes these items come in before you place them out on the curb. What you put out will advertise what you have in your home.
- Be a "Nosy" Neighbor. Call 911 when you see or hear any suspicious people or activity. Try to get a description, license plate, direction of travel, and describe what they are doing.
- If you are going on vacation, contact the Police Department at 630-823-5500 and have your house placed on the vacation watch list.



Fire Department

Fire Department Begins Testing New Protective Suits

As part of the ongoing Department of Homeland Security funded SMARTER research project, the Department took delivery of two trial sets of “technical rescue” gear. This gear was designed and custom made for Hanover Park by Globe Firesuits®. The gear, in concept, is based on information discovered as part of the SMARTER study. Early in the data analysis phase of the study it was discovered that the physiological impact of heat stress was much more significant than originally thought. Prior to the SMARTER study, data had been collected on firefighters working in a laboratory/live fire training facility. However, the “in-field study” has shown that core body temperatures on firefighters wearing structural turnout gear are significantly higher than originally thought. Temperatures in the range of 103° are common. We also know that the body’s temperature continues to climb even after firefighters are removed from the work environment and have doffed their protective gear. It is a well-documented fact that temperatures reaching 105° can begin to damage brain cells.



Based on this new information discovered during the field study, the Department along with the SMARTER team began working to find a protective gear solution for incidents where heavy thermal protection is not needed. The new “technical rescue” gear is designed to provide flash, abrasion and blood borne pathogen protection without the thermal protection of structural gear. The plan is to have personnel replace wearing structural gear with the “technical rescue” gear for all non-structural fire and vehicle fire incidents. The gear will be field tested by Hanover Park personnel, while six identical sets will be laboratory tested at the First Responder Health and Safety Laboratory at Skidmore College. Globe Firesuits® who is a partner in the SMARTER study provided the test gear at no cost to the Department. Dinges Fire Company, the Department’s normal sales vendor for our current structural gear, provided boots, gloves and hoods for use with the “technical rescue” gear; also at no cost to Hanover Park. If the gear accomplishes the expected results, the Department will be submitting a Department of Homeland Security – Assistance to Firefighters Grant to purchase gear for all firefighters.

Keep the Wreath Red

The "Keep the Wreath Red" program is used to raise fire safety awareness during the holiday season and has become an annual event, each of the 2 Hanover Park Fire Stations has a wreath that is wrapped with red lights. The wreaths remain lit twenty-four hours a day during the holiday season. If a fire occurs that is determined to be the result of a holiday decoration, a white bulb replaces a red bulb on the wreath. The hope is the wreath will serve as a constant reminder to practice fire safety during the holiday season. Some suggestions for holiday fire safety are:

- Needles on fresh trees should be green and hard to pull back from the branches, and the needles should not break if the tree has been freshly cut. The trunk should be sticky to the touch.
- Do not place your tree close to a heat source, including a fireplace or heat vent. The heat will dry out the tree, causing it to be more easily ignited by heat, flame or sparks.
- Never put tree branches or needles in a fireplace or wood-burning stove. When the tree becomes dry, discard it promptly.
- Inspect holiday lights each year for frayed wires, bare spots, gaps in the insulation, broken or cracked sockets, and excessive kinking or wear before putting them up. Use only lighting listed by an approved testing laboratory.
- Do not link more than three light strands, unless the directions indicate it is safe. Connect strings of lights to an extension cord before plugging the cord into the outlet
- All decorations should be nonflammable or flame-retardant and placed away from heat vents.
- Ensure that trees and other holiday decorations do not block an exit way. In the event of a fire, time is of the essence. A blocked entry/exit way puts you and your family at risk
- Wrapping paper in the fireplace can result in a very large fire, throwing off dangerous sparks and embers that may result in a chimney fire.
- If you do use lit candles, make sure they are in stable holders and place them where they cannot be easily knocked down. Never leave the house with candles burning.



Public Works

Arlington Drive Bridge Replacement

The replacement of the Arlington Drive bridge over the West Branch DuPage River is coming!

The Village has all of our bridges inspected each year. In 2014, it was noted that the timber piles at the piers of the Arlington Drive West bridge over the West Branch DuPage River were deteriorating to a threshold where six-month special inspections were needed. This made it eligible for replacement using federal funds, and the Village applied to IDOT to receive those funds.



The proposed scope of work includes the removal of the 50+ year-old existing bridge structure and installation of a concrete box culvert. The project will require a temporary closure of Arlington Drive West for construction operations. The proposed detour utilizes a state route (Lake Street/US 20) and will be coordinated with them.

The preliminary bridge design and hydraulic report will be submitted to the Federal Highway Administration this fall, and final design documents are expected to be completed in the later part of 2018. It is anticipated that construction will take place in 2019. Stay tuned for further developments. Please note the weight restriction has been lowered to 5 tons.

Holiday Light Recycling

The Hanover Park Environmental Committee, in cooperation with Elgin Recycling, Inc., is collecting used holiday lights and extension cords for recycling. Bring in your entire strands, including lights that no longer work, to the Hanover Park Public Works Department, Monday through Friday, 8:00 am to 3:30 pm. The Village will collect these items through the end of March.



Christmas Tree Recycling

Christmas trees will be recycled throughout the Village on Saturday, **January 6th** and Friday, **January 12th**. Place your Christmas tree in the parkway and follow these guidelines:



- Do not put trees in plastic bags.
- Remove the stand and all decorations including lights, garland, tinsel, and metal (such as nails).
- Dispose of artificial or natural wreaths in the regular household garbage.
- Do not place artificial trees at the curb for recycling.

Set your tree out on the above dates. However, if you miss the special collection dates, Groot, Inc. will collect Christmas trees along with your regular garbage and refuse collection. This service will be provided to the homeowners associations not regularly serviced by Groot, Inc.

Groot Inc. Purchases Republic Services

Recently, Groot, Inc., a local Illinois waste hauler, purchased part of the assets held by Republic Services, the Village's current residential waste hauler. What does that mean to the residents of Hanover Park? Not much, actually. Eventually the trucks will say Groot and not Republic. Everything else will remain the same, including the support telephone number (630-469-1036), collection day, materials that can be collected and yard waste. - Environmental Projects



Snow Plowing Safety Tips

The Village of Hanover Park is asking for your help this winter. Snow plowing is an emergency service that not only helps you get to and from your work and recreation, but it also helps the Police Department and Fire Department get to emergencies faster. Your Public Works Department is dedicated to providing the best possible snow fighting efforts to help you go about your day. Please review the following list and help us make the community a safer place to travel this winter.

- Don't follow too closely! Stay back at a safe distance from snow plows. They can stop abruptly when salting and plowing. Remember, if you can't see the driver in the mirrors of the vehicle, they can't see you!
- When salting, the spinner can rotate at a very high rate. Staying back will keep the salt from hitting your vehicle and keeping you at a safe distance.
- Do not pass a snow plow! Snow and debris are being thrown at a high rate of speed. It can be dangerous and damage your car.
- Don't push snow into the street. If the plows have already finished in the neighborhood, pushing snow back out onto the street can cause ice to form and once bonded to the asphalt, it can be very hard to get off. See the diagram which shows the ideal way to shovel your driveway.
- Do you really have to go out? If it is snowing, and you don't need to go out, stay home and enjoy the view. The leading cause of death from winter storms isn't exposure or exhaustion. It is car accidents. Stay home, enjoy a family activity, watch TV or read a book.
- Snow is heavy and hard to move, if you have a neighbor that is having a hard time pushing the snow off of their driveway, help them out.
- Please keep your vehicle off the street while it is snowing or until plowing operations are complete. Plowing around these vehicles is difficult and leaves snow in the streets once the cars are moved.



REMEMBER...No parking on Village streets after a two (2) inch snow.

Household Hazardous Waste

A growing problem in many households is the disposal of household hazardous waste. The Illinois Environmental Protection Agency defines hazardous as corrosive, reactive, toxic, or ignitable. Household products used in the bathroom, kitchen, garage, workshop, lawn, and gardens contain chemicals that contribute to the contamination of water supplies and natural resources when discarded.

Examples of household hazardous waste include: paint, turpentine, wood preservatives, stains, pesticides, herbicides, ant killers, drain cleaners, rug cleaners, toilet cleaners, household batteries, oven cleaners, pool chemicals, ammonia-based cleaners, and automotive products such as antifreeze, transmission fluid, brake fluid, used oil, and batteries.

Consumers are responsible for the safe environmental management and disposal of household hazardous wastes. The best solution for the disposal of these products is to avoid disposal by the frugal use and purchase of these materials. Fully use these products so that no waste remains except residuals attached to the container. Read disposal instruction on the container.



A second option would be to recycle the waste. Jiffy Lube, located at 1600 Irving Park Road, will accept motor oil. They can be reached at (630) 289-7744. They will accept five gallons of oil per visit at no charge. The manager of Jiffy Lube requests the oil be dropped off during regular business hours, placed in a sealed container (that is, the original container or a capped milk or water jug), and not mixed with any other fluid.

Northern Frame and Auto, located at 2331 Walnut Ave., will accept automotive batteries and oil. They can be reached at (630) 830-8555. Residents can drop off old batteries at no charge during regular business hours.

A third option for the management of household hazardous waste is storing the chemicals in a safe place in the home until a hazardous waste collection is offered. The waste should be stored in the original container in a cool, dry place. The IEPA conducts hazardous waste collection days throughout the state in the spring and fall. ICSC Chicago Deal Making Convention

On September 27-28, Mayor Craig, Village Trustee Herb Porter, Community and Economic Development Director Govind and Village Planner Ainsworth attended the International Council of Shopping Centers (ICSC) convention Chicago Deal Making at the Navy Pier and met with several restaurant representatives, realtors, brokers and developers in an effort to market the Village and to recruit new businesses.

The vacancy rate for retail spaces in the Village has consistently fallen from over 20% vacant in 2012 to less than 6% vacant in 2017. Staff continues its efforts to bring new development, which is aligned with the vision and needs of the community.



22nd Annual Mayor’s Choice Business Awards

Residents and businesses are encouraged to nominate outstanding Hanover Park businesses for our Mayor’s Choice Awards. Nominated businesses must be located in Hanover Park, and judging will be conducted by the Village of Hanover Park C.O.N.E.C.T. Committee using the following criteria: Community Involvement, Excellence in Customer Service; and Positive Image and Appearance.

Two awards are available. Small Business (less than 50 employees) and Large Business (more than 50 employees).

From the nominated businesses, a “People’s Choice” award will be given to the business with the most votes.

In 2017, the C.O.N.E.C.T. Committee revised the criteria to level the playing field for our Hanover Park businesses. Winning businesses are only eligible to win every other year. *For example if they won in 2016 they will not be eligible to win until 2018 for the Mayor’s Choice Award.*

All nominated businesses are entered into the People’s Choice Award and can be eligible to win consecutive years.



Winter Weather Terms

With Winter approaching, now is a good time to familiarize yourself with the terminology that the National Weather Service uses to convey the weather threat to the public.

WATCHES, WARNINGS AND ADVISORIES

- **Winter Storm Watch:** Indicates severe winter weather such as heavy snow or ice is possible within the next day or two. Be prepared!
- **Winter Storm Warning:** Indicates heavy snow (greater than 6 inches), heavy sleet (½ inch or greater), or a combination of winter weather hazards is highly likely or occurring. Stay indoors and adjust travel plans.
- **Ice Storm Warning:** Heavy accumulations of ice will create extremely dangerous travel conditions, damage trees and likely cause extended power outages.
- **Blizzard Warning:** Strong winds of 35 mph or greater will produce blinding snow and near zero visibility, resulting in potentially life-threatening conditions, especially for travelers. Blizzard conditions can occur with minimal accumulations of snow.
- **Wind Chill Warning:** Life-threatening wind chills of minus 25 degrees or colder.
- **Winter Weather Advisory:** Indicates snow accumulation of 2 to 5 inches or a combination of winter weather conditions which may cause significant inconveniences and may be hazardous, especially to travelers. Use caution if you venture out!
- **Freezing Rain Advisory:** Light accumulations of ice will cause hazardous travel.
- **Wind Chill Advisory:** Dangerous wind chills of minus 15 degrees to minus 24 degrees.

WINTER WEATHER TERMS

- **Freezing Rain:** Precipitation that falls from the clouds as rain, but freezes into a glaze of ice on ground-based objects (trees, power lines, roads, cars, etc.).
- **Sleet:** Small pellets of ice created by frozen raindrops. Sleet bounces when hitting a surface and does not stick to objects.
- **Wind Chill:** A calculation of how cold it feels outside when the effects of temperature and wind speed are combined. Wind chill ONLY applies to bare, human skin. The effects of wind chill are different for animals and don't apply to non-living objects.
