

Census 101: Hanover Park is Committed to a Complete Count!

How the 2020 Census will invite everyone to respond

Every household will have the option of responding online, by mail, or by phone.

Nearly every household will receive an invitation to participate in the 2020 Census from either a postal worker or a census worker.

95% of households will receive their census invitation in the mail.

What to Expect in the Mail

When it's time to respond, most households will receive an invitation in the mail.

Every household will have the option of responding online, by mail, or by phone.

Depending on how likely your area is to respond online, you'll receive either an invitation encouraging you to respond online or an invitation along with a paper questionnaire.

Letter Invitation

Most areas of the country are likely to respond online, so most households will receive a letter asking you to go online to complete the census questionnaire.

We plan on working with the U.S. Postal Service to stagger the delivery of these invitations over several days. This way we can spread out the number of users responding online, and we'll be able to serve you better if you need help over the phone.

Letter Invitation and Paper Questionnaire

Areas that are less likely to respond online will receive a paper questionnaire along with their invitation. The invitation will also include information about how to respond online or by phone.

CPR Training

According to the American Heart Association, every year in America, over 350,000 people are victims of sudden cardiac arrest (SCA). Providing just chest compressions can buy vital time necessary to allow emergency medical personnel to arrive at your location. Learning CPR and how to use an Automated External Defibrillator (AED), if administered immediately after cardiac arrest, can double or triple survival rates of a friend or loved one.



As an American Heart Association (AHA) authorized training center, the Hanover Park Fire Department hosts various classes that can give you the training and education to save someone's life. If you can dedicate a short period of time, we have a

class for you. We have pre-scheduled AHA classes that are held at our Headquarters Fire Station located at 6850 Barrington Road. If you are a novice who is interested in receiving an AHA certification, we have the AHA Heartsaver CPR/AED and first aid classes. You can gain knowledge and hands-on skills that would be beneficial for almost any emergency. If you are a medical professional or work in a field requiring this certification, we can provide you training as a certified AHA Healthcare Provider. Depending on the size of the class, each Heartsaver and Healthcare Provider class can take approximately 4 hours to complete. Please look on our website at <https://www.hpil.org/357/CPR-First-Aid-Classes> to see our prescheduled AHA classes.

Additionally, if you are part of a group and our prescheduled dates don't work for you, our instructors can travel to different locations within the community or surrounding area. We can offer customized training based on the end user's schedule and needs.

If your schedule doesn't allow you to set aside 4 hours, the Fire Department can also provide classes such as "Bystander CPR or Hands Only CPR". This class is supported through a statewide grant program from Illinois Heart Rescue (ILHR). This class can be taught in as little as 10 minutes. Participants watch a short 5-minute video and then receive hands-on practice with mannequins. That's it! An excellent opportunity for the whole family to learn.

Summer Fire Prevention Tips

Bring out the grills, turn on the A/C, and fire up the lawn mower. It's summertime!

While the days are longer, the pace is slower, and the fun is at a maximum, don't forget about fire safety. Summertime brings its share of fire hazards in and around your home, and it's crucial that you brush up on your fire prevention tips for summer. Read on about the biggest fire hazards in your home this season.

The Grill

Nothing beats the barbecued flavor. You just can't duplicate it indoors. It's no wonder we all can't wait to fire up the grill as soon as it warms up. But take caution. Make sure your grill is not up against your house (and NEVER use your grill inside your home). Remove any overhanging branches and designate 3 feet around the grill as the safe zone. Don't walk away from your grill unless someone else has eyes on it — especially if you have kids or pets running around. And be sure to regularly remove grease buildup.



The Lawnmower

Take care of your lawnmower. Read and follow the recommendations about maintenance from the manufacturer. Regularly check the mufflers, engines, and cutting units for grass and other debris. If your lawnmower overheats, wait to refuel it.

The A/C

Surprisingly, air conditioning, fans, or related equipment are involved in thousands of home fires each year. Most of these fires are due to mechanical or electrical failures. They can happen because the unit is being overused or it isn't properly maintained. You can prevent overuse by turning the air conditioner off during the peak hours of electrical usage. Your electric company can tell you these hours for your area.

Maintain your central air conditioning unit by having it professionally maintained once a year, change your filter each month, and keep the unit clear of leaves, debris, and dirt.

Remember Your Smoke Detectors

A smoke detector can be a lifesaver for your family. Make sure you regularly check that your smoke alarms are working. Set a reminder on your phone for the first day of each month so that you'll never miss checking them. In addition, make sure you

have working smoke alarms on every level of your home. There should also be one inside and outside of each bedroom.

Know What to Do

Learn now what to do if there is a fire in your home — and practice the steps. Every member of your family should know basic fire safety rules and how to protect themselves in a fire.

Carbon Monoxide Safety

Carbon monoxide (CO), also known as the silent killer, is an odorless and colorless gas produced by stoves, lanterns, burning charcoal and wood, as well as gas ranges and heating systems. Many people mistake the symptoms of CO poisoning for coming down with the flu. The symptoms of carbon monoxide poisoning include Headache, Nausea, Dizziness, Vomiting and Confusion.

What causes Carbon Monoxide Detector beeping?

It's safe to say that most people are more familiar with the sound of their smoke detector or fire alarm than with the sound of their carbon monoxide detector beeping. For this reason, it is important to know that when your carbon monoxide detector goes off it will sound like intermittent beeping. The sound will be much like the one your smoke detector makes when the battery needs to be changed. When this alarm sounds (intermittent beeps) it means this gas has been leaking unbeknownst to you and it has reached a dangerous level.

What to do when you hear your carbon monoxide detector beeping: The first thing — DO NOT ignore the beeping of the alarm. If you or others in your household are experiencing any of the symptoms mentioned previously follow these directions: Call 9-1-1 immediately, go to a hospital immediately and DO NOT re-enter the home until emergency services has indicated it is safe to return.

If no one is showing signs or symptoms of carbon monoxide poisoning, follow these directions:

- Open all windows to get air ventilation.
- Turn off any appliances such as your gas-fired furnace or a running generator.
- After the home has gotten ventilation, reset the carbon monoxide detectors.
- If the detectors do not sound again, call a qualified technician to inspect and repair any problem.
- Should the alarm sound a second time and no one is showing signs of CO poisoning, vent the home and call the fire department. Emergency personnel will advise you when it is safe to return home.

Adopt-A-Street Program Clean-up Event

The Elsie Johnson Elementary School Environmental Club held their first official clean-up along Nautilus Lane on Wednesday, May 15, 2019. In December 2018, the school entered into an agreement with the Village of Hanover Park to join the Adopt-A-Street program. Under this program, environmentally minded civic organizations, private corporations and others can volunteer to help keep our Village streets litter-free. Elsie Johnson School agreed to "adopt" Nautilus Lane from Marine Drive to Windjammer Lane, which includes a minimum of four litter pick-up days per year.



On the afternoon of May 15th, Village staff Andy Sikich and Dave Shah provided training, vests and gloves to teachers Cyndi Chapman and Margaret Uhlig, and over 30 students and adult chaperones. The event went well, and the students collected several bags of litter.

The Adopt-A-Street program is available to any organization within the Village of Hanover Park that can meet the minimum criteria of the program (set by State Statute). The Village provides signage, vests, gloves, garbage bags and training, and removes the garbage upon the completion of each clean-up

Firefighters Need YOUR Help...

Come Join our Team

The Fire Corps team is the only all-volunteer team within the Hanover Park Fire Department. The team currently performs and assists the department with many tasks. Some responsibilities our volunteers take on include emergency scene incident rehab, public education events, open house, station tours, and smoke detector installations.



The leading cause of firefighter line-of-duty deaths is cardiovascular events. Heat stress adds to the cardiovascular strain because of the need for the body to supply blood to the active muscles and to the vessels close to the surface for cooling the body. The sweating decreases the circulating plasma volume and stress hormones increase the clotting factors in the blood. To help combat these issues incident rehab is needed. The

components of rehab consist of rest, recovery, rehydration, nourishment, medical monitoring, and relief from the incident and environmental conditions.

Team members meet monthly to train in order to work side-by-side with firefighters and EMS workers.

The Fire Corps team is always looking for individuals that are enthusiastic and energetic about being involved and giving back to their community. All completed applications must be submitted to the Headquarters Fire Station located at 6850 Barrington Road.

Requirements include: Age 21 at time of application; no felony convictions; and have a valid driver's license. There are no residency requirements

Hot Weather Tips

Anyone can develop heat stress. However, the following groups of people have higher risks for experiencing heat stress or heat-related death: Infants and children up to four years of age, people 65 years of age and older, people who are overweight, and people who are ill or on certain medications.

Heat-related death or illnesses are preventable if you follow a few simple steps.

- Stay in an air-conditioned area during the hottest hours of the day. If you don't have air conditioning in your home, go to a public place such as a shopping mall or a library to stay cool. Cooling stations and senior centers are also available in many large cities for people of all ages.
- Wear light, loose-fitting clothing.
- Drink water often. Don't wait until you are thirsty.
- Avoid unnecessary hard work or activities if you are outside or in a building without air-conditioning.
- Avoid unnecessary sun exposure. When in the sun, wear a hat, preferably with a wide brim.

Air conditioning is the strongest protective factor against heat-related illness. Exposure to air conditioning for even a few hours a day will reduce the risk for heat-related illness.

Live Fire Training

The Hanover Park Fire department personnel are continually training to improve on new skills, sharpen old skills, and work on different tactics that are learned through fire service research. Firefighters complete small training exercises daily that are current with the standards set by the department's training division. All the skills that are practiced are related to the skill set needed to perform a variety of job functions when firefighters are called to assist with a medical emergency or a fire related incident.

On a bi-annual basis, the training division provides "live fire" training scenarios to every member of the organization. Live fire training takes place at a fixed, non-combustible facility that allows for small fires to be lit inside the structure. These fires are lit by instructors and are contained to a metal bin. They are lit by using organic materials such as straw and wood. The fires are always monitored to ensure that they are not able to grow or exceed dangerous temperatures. After the fires are lit, firefighters stretch hose lines into the structure to extinguish the fire. Simultaneously, other firefighters are practicing searches and ventilation techniques.

In early May, the Hanover Park Fire Department completed the bi-annual live fire training jointly with Streamwood Fire Department personnel. Hanover Park and Streamwood assist each other with emergency calls on a regular basis. Training together provides all our personnel a better working relationship with each other and a better understanding of each department's standard operating procedures. For three days both organizations trained on hose deployment, fire extinguishment, search and rescue of victims, ladders, ventilation, and fire flow paths. The training took place at the Elgin Community College Emergency Services campus in Burlington, IL.



- Do not use consumer fireworks.
- Keep a close eye on children at events where fireworks are used.

CONSUMER FIREWORKS

NFPA is opposed to consumer use of fireworks. This includes sparklers and firecrackers. Even sparklers burn hot enough to cause third-degree burns.



FACTS

- ! Fireworks cause an average of almost 18,500 reported fires per year.
- ! Sparklers account for roughly one-quarter of emergency room fireworks injuries.
