## Census 101

### What is a census and why is it important?

Once a decade, America comes together to count every resident in the United States, creating national awareness of the importance of the census and its valuable statistics. The decennial census was first taken in 1790, as mandated by the Constitution. The census provides vital information for you and your community. It determines how many representatives each state gets in Congress and is used to redraw district boundaries. Redistricting counts are sent to the states by March 31, 2021. Communities rely on census statistics to plan for a variety of resident needs including new roads, schools, and emergency services. Businesses use census data to determine where to open places to shop. It counts our population and households, providing the distribution of more than \$675 billion in federal funds annually to support states, counties and communities' vital programs — impacting housing, education, transportation, employment, health care and public policy.

The next census is coming in 2020. Counting an increasingly diverse and growing population is a massive undertaking. It requires years of planning and the support of thousands of people. In 2020, the census will implement new technology to

make it easier than ever to respond to the census. For the first time, you will be able to respond online, by phone, as well as by mail. The census will use data that the public has already provided to reduce followup visits. The census is building an accurate address list and automating our field operations—all while keeping your information confidential and safe.

Ultimately, the success of the census depends on everyone's participation. The Census Bureau depends on cross-sector collaborations with organizations and individuals to get people to participate.

The 2020 Census is important for you and your community, and you can help. The census affects your voice in government, how much funding your community receives and how your community plans for the future. Join us in spreading the word.

At the Village Board meeting of May 2, 2019, the Village of Hanover Park held a swearing in ceremony for three Village Trustees.

Trustees James Kemper was first elected as Village Trustee in 2011. This will be his third term as Village Trustee. He has also been a member of the Village's Cultural Inclusion & Diversity Committee.

# Spring Weather Safety

Spring weather can be unpredictable.

When severe weather hits unexpectedly, the risk of injury and death increases, so planning is essential. Whenever warm, moist air collides with cool, dry air, thunderstorms occur. Thunderstorms bring lightning, tornadoes, and flooding.

The Village of Hanover Park has severe weather sirens. The sirens are tested the first Tuesday of the month at 10 a.m. When the sirens are activated in a real weather emergency, residents will hear a 3-5 minute steady signal of the sirens. Seek shelter in the most interior room or basement of your home or office. You should avoid outside walls and windows. An interior bathroom, closet or other room is generally the safest location. If you have access to a radio or television, tune to a local channel to listen for essential emergency information.

Items to have on hand prior to the storm include:

- A battery-operated flashlight and NOAA weather radio. Extra batteries for both
- A list of important personal information, including: telephone numbers of neighbors, family, and friends; insurance and property information; telephone numbers of utility companies; medical information; First Aid Kit; a 3-5 day supply of bottled water and nonperishable food; personal hygiene items; and blankets or sleeping bags

Talk to family members about where emergency supplies are stored, and make sure they know how to turn off the water, gas, and electricity in your home.

# Be Mindful of Water Quality!

In order to be mindful of water quality this summer, property owners are encouraged to consider practicing natural lawn care and implementing green infrastructure projects to reduce pollutants reaching DuPage County waterways.



Commonly referred to as nonpoint source pollutants, these contaminants include fertilizer and pesticides, car oils, pet waste and litter. Once mixed in with stormwater runoff, they drain directly to streams and storm sewers off impervious surfaces, such as roadways, sidewalks and roofs.

Residents can reduce the amount of pollutants involved with lawn care by following natural practices, including:

- Use a simple and inexpensive soil test to determine what, if any, nutrients are needed.
- If nutrients are necessary, use natural compost instead of traditional fertilizer. Consider composting lawn clippings, leaves and other natural materials.
- Eliminate pesticide use by hand pulling any weeds.
- Allow grass to grow up to three inches before mowing, which improves its health by allowing roots to grow longer. These longer roots will also help remove pollutants from stormwater runoff.

In addition, residents may consider these green alternatives to common home improvement projects:

- Install a rain garden with deep-rooted native plants to filter pollutants from stormwater runoff.
- Use a rain barrel or larger rainwater harvesting system to capture rainwater for reuse, such as lawn irrigation.
- Instead of repaving driveways, consider installing permeable pavers or porous concrete that allows stormwater to permeate through instead of running off.

# Why Do I Need A Building Permit?

Building permits are required to promote the safety and wellbeing of all residents, businesses, and visitors in the village. The enforcement of minimum construction standards provides many important benefits to you and other occupants.

- Permits allow the Fire Department - Inspectional Services Division an opportunity to review your project for compliance with adopted building codes. These codes exist in many cases as a result of actual failures that have occurred. They seek to prevent similar failures from re-occurring.
- Permits ensure adequate fire suppression systems and/or notification systems are in place to give occupants the best opportunity to escape in an emergency and minimize damage to property.
- Permits ensure a clear path and that a minimum number of exits are available to escape a building in an emergency.
- Permits help to create accessible, barrier-free designs so that all occupants may enjoy your property.
- Permits help guide a do-it-yourself project. There are many small construction details within your property that are meant to provide safety. Without a thorough knowledge of building codes, an otherwise handy person might unknowingly create an unsafe situation which could have been prevented during review of the proposed plans.
- Permits keep contractors from cutting corners to drive down their cost. A permit will require that inspections occur regularly as your project progresses. Work not meeting minimum code requirements will not be accepted.
- Permits help to maintain insurance coverage. An insurance claim for work that is revealed to have been completed without a permit may not be covered by your insurance company. The costs to repair property damaged by fire or medical expenses from a person injured on your property can be extensive.
- Permits help in the process of selling a property. Buyers for properties want to know that previous work performed was completed in a safe manner. A building permit assures that accepted minimum standards have been followed.

## Odor Control

### Project at MWRD

Beginning this summer, the Metropolitan Water Reclamation District (MWRD) will begin construction of two odor control facilities at the Hanover Park Reclamation Plant. These two control facilities will be at the wet well, where all incoming sewage goes into the treatment plant, and at the solids treatment complex, where solid materials are removed from the sewage and treated. These improvements will use bio-trickling filters and carbon absorption processes to reduce odors and alleviate exhaust. MWRD asks that you be patient during the construction, which could last as long as two years to fully implement the \$1.7 million dollar investment into the plant.



# National Stroke Awareness Month

## Hemorrhagic Stroke vs. Ischemic Stroke

Stroke is the fifth leading cause of death and disability in the United States. A Stroke is a condition in which there is an acute neurologic insult that occurs as a result of ischemic cerebral infarction (87% of strokes) or brain hemorrhage (13% of stroke).

Ischemic stroke (picture on the left) results from a blockage in an artery caused by a blood clot or plaque buildup. This blood flow stoppage or restriction interrupts the oxygen supply and causes brain tissue damage. A hemorrhagic stroke (picture on the right) is caused from a broken blood vessel and allows blood to escape into the brain tissue.



Once a stroke has occurred, it is imperative for paramedics to provide rapid transport to a Comprehensive Stroke Center where the stroke can be treated. The closest Stroke Centers to Hanover Park are Northwestern Central DuPage Hospital and AMITA Alexian Brothers Medical Center.

Using the acronym F.A.S.T. bystanders and family members can quickly identify the warning signs of a stroke and call for immediate assistance.

## New 2019 Illinois Car Seat Law

Effective Jan. 1, 2019, Illinois law requires children under age 2 to be properly secured in a rear-facing child restraint system unless they weigh more than 40 pounds or are more than 40 inches tall. Children riding rear-facing may use a rear-facing only car seat or a convertible car seat installed rear-facing.

## Safety Seat Installations

The Hanover Park Fire Department offers child safety seat installation. The safety seats will be installed according to manufacturer's direction and a removal and re-installation procedure will be demonstrated by the technician. The technician will also check for manufacturer's recall and product updates.

Prior to requesting an installation, the seat/vehicle owner should check the seat for its expiration date; only unexpired seats will be installed. Owners should also bring all manufacturer's documents and instructions with them to the appointment. About an hour should be allotted for each child safety seat installation. Bicycle registrations are FREE for as long as you own the bike, and can include photographs, additional information about distinguishing features or accessories. The site also offers good advice and information, especially about bike locks.

Users can access their registration through the website. They also have apps for both Apple and Android devices. If your registered bike is reported stolen, it will be posted on the website. Then, when the serial number is run in the registry, the police department will be notified, no matter where in the country it is recovered.

The ordinance states that all premises and exterior property shall be maintained free from weeds or plant growth in excess of eight (8) inches. All noxious weeds shall be prohibited. Weeds shall be defined as all grasses, annual plants and vegetation, other than trees or shrubs provided; however, this term shall not include cultivated flowers and gardens. Questions?
